Pastor's Reflection

I want to start by quoting one of my favorite theologians, SGC Associate Pastor Clare Robert. In our many discussions about ministry, she often notes that she believes ministry is really about letting people feel that someone knows their story. As she sees it, part of our job as a Christian Community is to carry each other's stories.

At the end of June, a team of 10 of us from our OASIS Multi-Church Youth Group, with an additional family of 4 from my childhood church in Greenwich, travelled to the Simply Smiles Home for



Children in Oaxaca, Mexico. For me, one of the most important elements of these service-learning trips is getting to know people's stories.

One of my other favorite theologians, our Simply Smiles staff trip leader and former CT State Troubadour Kristen Graves said "Once you've seen this kind of poverty, you can't unsee it. Once you know these kids, you can't un-know them and pretend they don't exist." We now know their stories. We carry their stories with us. Their lives are now part of our congregation.

Sure, the kitchen we painted was important work for creating a joy-filled nutritional space for these kids. Sure, the patio we tiled outside the laundry room was important work for making it feel like home. But these are just tangible representations of the real work, the work of becoming part of each other's lives, learning each other's stories, sharing each other's dreams and discovering the heartache and laughter involved in discovering that dream.



Jeny, the high school senior who wants to be a lawyer and can spike a volleyball like a pro. Lucia, the 2nd grader who makes mud pies for her pretend cafe and gleefully runs at full speed during tag. Pedro, the eighth grader who loves playing cards, doing science experiments & art projects, and is super competitive at all sports. Some of them came to Simply Smiles because there were no educational opportunities in their mountain villages. Some came through child protective services. Some came after living on the street or at other children's homes. All of them are full of love, joy, and world-changing levels of potential. (continued on page 6)

A memoir about making do and taking risks, about the messiness of community and the power of grace, *Searching for Sunday* is about overcoming cynicism to find hope and, somewhere in between, Church. She has greatly enjoyed her time at Spring

Glen helping to teach Sunday School in the 5th-7th grade class, co-leading a new Bible study that explored scripture through the lens of affirmation for the LGBTQIA+ community, and worshipping on Sunday mornings. Gaby Chavez, the woman who runs the Simply Smiles Home for Children (who also grew up in a neighboring children's home and who attended Sacred Heart University in Fairfield, CT with the support of Simply Smiles) talked about how most children's home in the area don't celebrate the kids' birthdays, with the mentality that giving them a place to live should be enough. As the recent headlines from the border have horrifyingly reminded us, kids need a lot more than just a roof over their heads. Gaby notes that Simply Smiles' model is radically different from most others in celebrating individual birthdays, a clear message to the children that they matter as an individual and that they are loved uniquely, specifically, and wholly, that they are known and will not be forgotten, and that we carry their stories with us.

Hamden Tree Commission Names "Notable Tree" for June 2019

Hamden, CT – June 26, 2019

The Hamden Tree Commission is delighted to name this kousa dogwood (Cornus kousa) as this month's Hamden Notable Tree. The tree is located at Spring Glen Church on Whitney Avenue in the Spring Glen neighborhood of Hamden. The tree, a stunning example of its species, measures 28 feet tall and 40 feet wide. It provides a striking natural contrast to the brick church building and is almost as tall as the building itself.

The tree's cream-colored, four-pointed, star-like flowers form along an array of layered branches, and bloom during the month of June. The kousa dogwood is also known for its red, raspberry-shaped fruit which appears in September and October and matches the tree's bright autumn leaves. This species of dogwood has proven itself to be a hardy and adaptable tree that grows well in various settings. The combination of its delicate beauty and its hardiness make the kousa dogwood a landscaping staple in the northeastern United States.
