

Pastor's Reflection

Bubbles during the Closing Hymn? Rainbow skeletons on the lawn? Crashing cymbals during a sermon? A live organ soundtrack accompanying the original silent Dracula movie "Nosferatu" on Halloween night?

What in the name of God is going on at Spring Glen Church?!

At the point in the Bible where we are told humanity is made in God's image, the only thing we know about God is that She created the universe. When we read about imago dei, the only quality we know about God is that He is creative. Therefore, it would be logical to claim that when we lovingly tap into our joy-filled creativity, we are tapping into the divine spirit within us.

This past Sunday, November 3, we celebrated the 90th Anniversary to the day of our first Sunday School class. After noting what a significant statement about our values it is that our church held its first Sunday School class months before it held its first worship service, I lifted up a story about when former CE Director and current SGC member Muriel Smith brought a live baby lamb to the Sunday School to help the kids better connect with all the sheep and shepherd imagery in the Bible. The recent burst of creativity for me is simply tapping into a long history of using the arts to build community and worship God at Spring Glen Church.

Three years ago when I was discerning where God was calling me to serve as pastor, the thing that stood out to me about Spring Glen Church was your willingness to be creative; to try new wild experiments like the farmer's market and let it go when it became clear it's time had passed; to use multiple forms of music from Mendelssohn oratorios to modern pop rock to bluegrass classics; to think about theater as more than just a community activity but as an actual form of ministry. That creative spirit is the thing that has carried us through 90 years and will carry us through another 90. That way we embody theology through art rather than just talking about God is why our ministries are so transformative and life-giving.

As we launch into our Stewardship Pledge Campaign, I am also very aware that doing ministry in this way, creating ministry that matters, building church that is relevant, expanding faith in a way that actually transforms lives takes money. I want to thank everyone who is able to participate in the 90 for 90 challenge, to be one of the 90 to increase or start pledging in honor of our 90th Anniversary. I also want to thank people who can't increase because of life circumstance. Even if you have to decrease your pledge, remember Jesus preached that the poor widow's 2 cents were in some ways more powerful than the wealthy man's hundreds. Together, with all of our gifts united, we are creatively sustaining, growing, and reimagining the church that God needs us to be.


