

Pastor's Reflection

"To celebrate an anniversary is to do three overlapping things. It is to own our past, to rejoice in our present, and to take heart for our future."

That's what then-Senior-Pastor Rev. Phillip S. Washburn wrote on the occasion of our congregation's 50th Anniversary. Own our past. Rejoice in our present. Take heart for our future.

This coming program year marks the 90th anniversary of our founding. In October 2019, community members held multiple meetings for all interested in forming a Protestant church in the developing Spring Glen Neighborhood. On November 3, 1929 we held our first Sunday School classes. On December 26, 1930 we officially incorporated as the Church of Christ in Spring Glen. On January 5, 1930 we held our first worship service, appropriately on Epiphany Sunday. I think most noteworthy in that list of dates is that the first thing we did -- before we incorporated, before we worshipped together -- the very first ministry we offered was Sunday School.

In the same 50th Anniversary booklet, SGC's second (although some might argue the first) longterm preacher Rev. Victor Brown described the community this way:

"With the image of Christ as the central unifying figure, the new fellowship drew members from a wide spectrum of denominations, religious experiences and perspectives.

Our members were convinced they were creating a new pattern for the future."

It's amazing how much our character has remained consistent. Through all the cultural shifts, the institutional evolutions, the building changes, the membership growths, declines and rebounds, our details may look different, but our commitment to bring together many religious backgrounds around the central unifying figure of Christ has remained the same. And we are still striving to think boldly to set new patterns for the future.

One other thing has remained the same, encapsulated in this quote from Rev. Llewellyn "Lelly" Smith, our then-Moderator who had recently been ordained at a time when very few women were getting ordained and who would go onto a lengthy ministry in Massachusetts:

"Seriously, this place is so alive because the people around here are working -- and worshipping -- with a vital spirit. Our Fiftieth Anniversary is no accident!"

Spring Glen Church at 90 is still just as alive as it was at our 50th and at our founding. In our working and in our worshipping, our 90th Anniversary is no accident.

So join us on Rally Sunday September 8 for worship & Sunday School at 10am, with a picnic on the church lawn to follow. We'll kick off our 90th Anniversary of SGC's founding and celebrate the First Anniversary of Redeemer's transplant.



Introducing The Narrative Lectionary

Sometimes I joke that we are a congregation of "spiritual mutts." Rev. Clare often retorts that we're actually a congregation of "spiritual refugees."

However you look at it, we come from a lot of different backgrounds, denominations, religions, as designed at the founding of our congregation. Each of us has a radically different experience of faith and a wide range of comfort with the Bible. So we've decided to try out a little experiment to help give our diverse congregation a single unifying experience to anchor our many diversities.

Starting Rally Sunday September 8, Spring Glen Church's worship will be following the Narrative Lectionary, which covers the entirety of the Bible from September through May.

In the fall we will cover some of the highlights of the Hebrew Scriptures. Once we arrive at Advent and Christmas we will follow along with a single gospel all the way through Easter, over the course of four years becoming intimately more knowledgeable about the life of Jesus as recorded in all four gospels. After Easter we will cover some of the lesser known stories about what happened to the Christian movement after Jesus rose from the dead and later ascended into Heaven.

Every SGC member and friend is invited to follow along and read the same passage together whether you're in worship or not, giving us a common biblical foundation to anchor our beautifully diverse and unique spiritual journeys. The scripture lessons will be posted each month in the SpringBoard and every week in the weekly email to make it super easy to follow along. If you want to listen to any sermon you may have missed, you can find recordings on our website or subscribe to the Spring Glen Church podcast wherever you listen to your favorite podcasts.

Contemplative Prayer Orientation and Group Meeting

In the fall, we often have a renewed energy to make some changes in our lives, take on new perspectives or ideas, or try something different. If you have been looking for a practice which can support your desires for a deeper spiritual experience, you are welcome to join the Contemplative Prayer group. Contemplative practices help us to appreciate the beauty of the everyday, to notice the simple things, and to connect with God through silent prayer, meditation and other contemplative activities.

An Orientation to Contemplative Prayer will be held at 6:15-7:00 pm on Monday, September 23.

The regular meeting will be held immediately after at 7:15-8:15 and will meet going forward on the 4th Monday of the month.

Since 2015, a small group of SGC folk have been gathering for with these hopes in mind for a monthly group meeting called Contemplative Prayer. We have ranged over many topics and have learned a lot from each other. The purpose of our time together is to help us connect with ourselves, with each other and with God, extending beyond the group practices we have shared. But don't worry—as always, no pressure, no right or wrong way to practice, no homework, no guilt!

So often we pass by the grace moments in our haste to get on with life, achieve our goals, or just get through to the next thing. When we live at warp speed—and we all do it, because sometimes we have demanding responsibilities which engross us or stress us or because sometimes we don't know how to do otherwise, life can seem to just rush by. We arrive at the end of the day, sometimes fulfilled, but sometimes wishing for more—stillness, patience, awareness. We hit the pillow and give God a "little peck on the cheek" (in the words of Barbara Brown Taylor) and then take off the next morning to repeat the process. The group is not only for those who have "extra" or "free" time, but for anyone at any stage of life who would like to learn how to hit the "pause" button, even in the midst of daily busyness.

Our format is simple. We will sit in silence, learn a meditative skill or two, and reconnect with the Spirit moving among us. Periods of quiet are alternated with times of sharing. Our practices help us extend our appreciation of the graceful connections, which are right before our eyes and hidden at the same time. Contemplative connections can occur at any point that we pay attention to what we are experiencing, are mindful and alert, and express a word or two of gratitude.

As in the past, the group is open to new members at this first orientation and meeting, but then will go forward together.
